

donation place at each meeting to take care of our rent.















Famous Scandinavian
Victor Borge

Victor Borge was an entertainer, conductor, classical pianist, songwriter, actor, philanthropist, and comedian. Born Borge Rosenbaum on January 3rd, 1909 In Copenhagen, Denmark to musical parents. Bernhard and Frederikke Rosenbaum. His father was a violist for the Royal Danish Philharmonic Orchestra & his mother was a pianist. She started teaching him to play at age 2. He began reading music at age four and performed his first recital by age 8. When he was 14, while performing, he noticed that half of the audience were falling asleep, and the other half gravely watched, as if they were at an execution. He started playing faster and faster and the orchestra followed until the conductor lost his place. Victor walked over and pointed to the music in front of the conductor and the audience laughed. He realized then that interacting with the audience helped his stage fright. He received a full scholarship to the Royal Danish Academy of Music. He later studied in Vienna and Berlin. Victor, a Jew, publically satirized Hitler before WWII and so was blacklisted by the Nazis. He was performing in Stockholm when Germany invaded Denmark in 1940. From there, he fled to Finland and then escaped on the last Passenger ship from Europe to America, the *American Legion*. He arrived in America with \$20.00 in his pocket. (With \$3 due to customs) and unable to speak the language. He taught himself English by watching movies. For 15 cents he could watch a movie three times and he would challenge himself to be able to repeat every word by the 3rd one. He got language tapes and put a tape recorder under his pillow at night to go to sleep by. In 1941, just days after failing at a job pumping gas because of his poor English, he got a slot on Bing Crosby's radio show. In 1942, he received the award for Best New Radio Performer Of the Year. He had his own show by 1945, the same year as his Carnegie Hall debut. His humor combined deadpan delivery, clever word play, satire, irreverence, physical comedy, and music. His distinctively Danish comedy encouraged audience interaction, and he found humor in the mundane, and used physical and visual elements, maintaining dynamic energy and a high level of spontaneity marked by impeccable timing. He became a US citizen in 1948. In 1953, he starred in his Broadway show, Comedy In Music, which still holds the record for longest running one man show on Broadway, with 849 performances. In 1960 he was the highest paid entertainer in the world. In 1963 he founded "Thanks to Scandinavia", a fund dedicated to those who helped the Jews escape the German persecution during the war. He co-authored two books. He appeared in the New York Philharmonic, the Cleveland Orchestra, the Chicago Orchestra, the London Philharmonic, and The Royal Danish Philharmonic. He performed on several TV shows and specials, and was in movies. He's the recipient of the 22nd Kennedy Awards Center honors of lifetime achievement. He received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor. He was knighted by all five of the Nordic countries, and honored by US Congress. He received the Brotherhood Award, the Wadsworth Intern Award, the Georg Jensen Silver Award, & the Schubert Foundation Award. He was given several honorary doctorates and degrees. He married his first wife, Elsie Chilton, in 1933. After divorcing Elsie, he married Sarabel Sanna Scraper in 1953, and they stayed married until her death at the age of 83 in September 2000. He had five children and nine grandchildren. He started a poultry business In Connecticut in the 50s that developed the Rock Cornish game hen industry. He was still performing over 60 shows when he was 90. He died in his sleep in Connecticut on December 23, 2000, at age 91.

In early 1902 AC Nielsen took an option on a 1600 acre ranch east of Junction City. He divided the tracks into smaller AC Nielsen parcels and advertised in Danish newspapers in the mid-west inviting Danes to move and purchase the parcels. When AC Nielsen helped found Faith Lutheran on April 23rd 1902, Oregon had it's first and only Danish congregation. The church met in the current Fellowship Hall (Forsamlingshus) which was built in 1902 until the current sanctuary was completed in 1908. The church and hall were on Ivy (Hwy 99) until it was moved to it's current address in 1940. The statue of Thorvaldsen's Christ in the sanctuary was purchased by the Danish Ladies Aid and shipped from Denmark in 1913. The church prospered and grew with the Danish community in Junction City. By the 1940's English language services where firmly established with every other service being in Danish or English. In 1951 was the last regular service in Danish. The name Faith Lutheran Church was proposed by Pastor Harold Olsen in 1954 and accepted by congregation.

The now Faith Lutheran participated in the trend amongst other Lutheran churches in merging and uniting with other Lutheran bodies to form the Lutheran Church in America in 1963. In 1961 Faith Lutheran was a founding member of the Junction City Scandinavian Festival. Over the years its aebleskiver booth has become famous. Many families come and stand in line to eat this unique Danish treat. For many it is a long standing tradition to both buy the aebleskiver and work in the booth.

She wrote at her home in Lillehammer, which was occupied by Germans during WWII, when her family fled to Sweden.

Christmas Lights...Fairy Lights

According to Norma Gavick of The Chronicle (Springfield Newspaper)
Scandinavians & Germans are the first cultures to decorate their homes specifically for Christmas. They would put candles in the windows to welcome weary travelers, particularly Christians. They traditionally burn a Yule Log, meaning the Christmas season, Christ's birth. The log was large enough to last from Christmas to January 6, The Twelfth Night. What was left would then be placed under a bed for good luck & protection from lightening & fires. Sounds a bit dangerous to me!



Ice hotel, Jukkasjärvi, Sweden.







Beds made of ice, chairs made of ice, walls made of ice, ceilings made of ice. What could be cooler than a night in an ice hotel In Arctic temperatures?

The very first Icehotel was built back in 1989. Where? In the Swedish village Jukkasjärvi, some 200 kilometres above the Arctic Circle.

Fast-forward to now, which brings us to Icehotel number 33 – built in 6 weeks and consisting of 500 tonnes of ice!

Each room is a unique work of art. Every year, guesting artists bring their own touch to transform frosty bedchambers into suites with ice sculptures and other creative elements. And every spring, the hotel and accompanying art exhibition melt back into the nearby Torne River – where the ice blocks and snow originally came from.

Thanks to the thick walls of ice and snow, the temperature in the rooms never drops below -5°C. Ready for an amICEing night in a sleeping bag? Also Check It Out page 2 the one in Finland.

Food (Mat)



This month we are going to tour our Scandinavian countries for <u>SOUP</u>. January is a cold month, and a warm soup really helps warm the body and soul. Just like here, they have a variety of soups, and every recipe is different and individualized. All of the soups are found in all of the countries. The name of the soup is given in the country in which we are "visiting" it.

Let's start off in Finland for some <u>BIDOS</u> (Reindeer stew). The Sami people have a close relationship with reindeer.



It is their livelihood. They live by the nose to tail diet; every part of the animal is utilized and nothing is wasted, including the hoofs. Don't worry there are no hooves in the soup. Their soup is characterized by the broth in which they slowly cook the reindeer meat in water. Often-times, it can include the bones and heart. Once they have the stock ready, the meat, carrots, & potatoes are added. it is a very straightforward stew recipe. https://sulten.app/en/recipes/bidos-bidjos-reindeer-casserole-m3lm

In Norway we shall try BERGENSK FISKESUPPE (Bergen fish soup). To be truly authentic you



need to buy live pollack and make it on the same day. However any seafood or fresh fish (pollack and salmon are preferred) will suffice. For vegetables they use pickled purslane, onion, carrots, leeks, & celery. It also has vinegar, salt, pepper, & sugar. Traditionally but rarely practiced now, it contains bones of young saithe. https://www.sofn.com/norwegian_culture/recipe_box/soups/bergens_fiskesuppe_bergen_fish_soup/

Now, let's go onward to Sweden where we'll get some ARTSOPPA (pea soup), which can be traced back to pre-Viking days. Especially in the northern parts of Scandinavia they have a short growing season, & luckily yellow peas, which are protein rich, grow quickly. It is traditionally served on Thursdays ever since the Middle Ages. This is possibly because it was normal for maids to work only a half day on Thursdays. They could start the soup in the morning, and then have their half day off and the family would still have a good supper. They start with either chicken stock or water & add the yellow peas, ham, carrots, and onions. A combo of herbs & spices are added & can contain cardamom, coriander, cinnamon, nutmeg, thyme, salt, pepper, marjoram, ginger or cloves. It's usually served with Swedish pancakes. https://www.thespruceeats.com/dried-pea-soup-

In Iceland we'll have <u>BLÓMKÁLSSÚPA</u> (Cauliflower soup). It often starts out as a cauliflower and juniper soup. You

can either steam or toast the cauliflower and add some butter, flour, onion, paprika, salt, white pepper & cream. Many add some dry white wine or sherry and a generous splash of aquavit and add some cardamom and/or nutmeg. Not to dominate but just some flecks of spice dotting the soup for a whisper of flavor in each bite, lending a gentle warmth. It can be garnished with chervil, or bacon chives, maybe small prawns or grilled scallops or parsely and croutons.

In Denmark we will enjoy <u>SØDSUPPE</u> (fruit soup). This is a very versatile soup. Served warm in the winter and cold in the summer. It can be served for breakfast, lunch, supper, dessert and smörgåsbord. They have it on holidays, at celebrations and give it as a nutritious present for new mothers. Any fruit can be used. Whatever is available whether canned, store bought or dried. Prunes are almost always found in it as well as raisins. You can use peaches, pears, tart apples, apricots, currants, fresh berries such as lingonberries, cloudberries and bilberries. I even found a rhubarb soup with ice cream. It also includes cinnamon, orange peel, tapioca, & lemon or grape juice. It's often cooked until it's nearly a compote. Recipe of the Month (Månedens oppskrift) HOLIDAY FRUIT SOUP-8 SERVINGS

I think this is pretty much American!

Ingredients

- ½ cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup peach juice or nectar, like Kern's brand
- 3 ½ tablespoons minute or quick-cooking tapioca, not large or small pearl
- 1 ½ cups orange juice
- 2 cans (11-ounces each) mandarin oranges, undrained
- 1 quart bottled or canned sliced peaches, drained (cut the peaches into smaller chunks, if needed)
- 2 cups sliced strawberries
- 1 cup fresh raspberries
- 1 cup blueberries

Instructions

- 1. In a medium saucepan, combine the sugar, water, peach juice/nectar, and tapioca. Bring the mixture to a boil and cook for 12 minutes, stirring often. Remove from the heat and pour into a bowl or other container. Stir in the orange juice and cover the dish. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours until completely chilled or up to several days.
- 2. Stir in the mandarin oranges, sliced peaches, strawberries, raspberries and blueberries. Chill until ready to serve (no longer than an hour or so once the fresh fruit has been added).

Judy's Recipe Corner

JOAN ABBOTT BLØMKAL SUPPE (NORWEGIAN CAULIFLOWER SOUP) 4 SERVINGS From Sons of Norway Recipes that Judy submitted a long time ago

Ingredients:

- 1 cauliflower
- 1 large carrot
- 1 large leek
- 2 celery stalks
- 4 parsley sprigs
- 4 cups meat stock or bouillon (preferably vegetable)
- Salt and pepper
- 3 Tblsp butter
- 2 ½ Tblsp flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3 Tbsp butter (softened; I use salted butter)
- 1 tsp. paprika
- 3 Tbsp flour
- 1 tsp. curry
- 1-1/8 cups coffee creamer (I use heavy whipping cream)
- 3 Tbsp breadcrumbs (I use Panko)
- ½ cup cheese, Jarlsberg or Gouda (I use Jarlsberg)

Directions:

Cut onions and boil onions until tender. Place in a 2-1/2 qt. baking dish.

Make white sauce using butter, flour and the cream.

Add grated cheese, salt, paprika, and curry and pour

over the onions. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and bake uncovered at 350F for 15 minutes.








The sloop Restauration arrives in North America-October 9, 2025


