## May 17th

Norway declared Independence as a country on May 17, 1815 ( their constitution was signed.) This day is referred to as *Syttende mai* ("Seventeenth of May"), *Nasjonaldagen* ("National Day") The common greeting on this day is "Gratulerer med dagen", which translates to "happy birthday".

In 1864 when the Holiday became more established. It launched the first children's parade. The parade consisted of only boys and it wasn't until 1899 that girls were allowed to join the parade. Today all over Norway you will find school children marching in parades.

On May 4, 1945 Denmark heard over the radio that they were liberated from Germany. Germany's occupation of Denmark began in April 1940.

So on May 5, Denmark's **Liberation Day**, you can see flags on buildings and on buses. The evening of May 4 many will light candles to place in their windows all across Denmark.

**June 5** is Denmark's Constitution day (Grundlovsdag), A Danish holiday commemorating the signing of the first Danish constitution in 1849 and the current one again in 1953.

## Old-Fashioned Norwegian Rhubarb Cake

This charming little cake is bursting with tart rhubarb and topped with a sweet, cinnamony crunch. A cozy treat that's perfect with a cup of coffee or tea - it's just the kind of recipe Grandma might've made on a spring afternoon.

Here's what you'll need:

- 2 cups chopped rhubarb
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, softened
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk

For the topping:

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

## How to make it: *1. get things started*

Preheat your oven to 350°F (175°C). Grease and flour a 9-inch round cake pan so your cake doesn't stick.

#### 2. mix the base

In a large bowl, cream together the butter and sugar until the mixture is light and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each one, then stir in the vanilla.

#### 3. combine the dry ingredients

In another bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Slowly add this to your wet mixture, alternating with the milk. Mix just until everything is combined.

#### 4. fold in the rhubarb

Gently stir the chopped rhubarb into the batter, making sure it's spread throughout. 5 nour and ton

## 5. pour and top

Pour the batter into your prepared pan and even it out with a spatula. In a small bowl, mix the brown sugar and cinnamon together, then sprinkle it over the top.

#### 6. bake and enjoy

Place the cake in the oven and bake for 40–45 minutes, or until a toothpick comes out clean and the top is golden. Let it cool before slicing and serving.

This rhubarb cake is a lovely way to celebrate the season—simple, sweet, and full of nostalgic flavor. Let me know if you want a version using sour cream or yogurt for an extra-moist twist!

# Mother's Day in the Scandinavian countries

Mother's Day originated in the United States in 1910 with the President declaring it a national holiday in 1914.

Finland has observed Mother's Day (Äitienpäivä) since 1918, it became a formal holiday in 1947. and is celebrated in the spring on the second Sunday of May. It is also an annual tradition for the president to honor about 30 mothers and mother figures with honorary medals of the White Rose Order. It is also considered a national flag day meaning that flags are raised throughout the country in honor of the celebration. Children usually have a special gathering at school for mothers where they enjoy tea, coffee, and baked goods. Children will often make cards and pick wildflowers such as Wood Anemones for their mothers as well. Sweden

Mother's Day (*Mors Dag*) was first celebrated in 1919 after Swedish author Cecilia Bååth-Holmberg proposed adopting the tradition from the U.S. Swedish flags are flown, many enjoy the day outdoors and some lucky moms may even be serenaded with a special song while enjoying breakfast in bed! They also have a special dinner. Mother's Day in Sweden is always celebrated on the last Sunday in May. The celebration includes flying the Swedish flag, making handmade cards, and picking wild daffodils - which are readily available during the last week of May. **Denmark** 

*Mors Dag* in Denmark was first observed in 1929. There are special Mors Dag cakes on this day and mom is served breakfast in bed, followed by a chore free day. Special commemorative plates have been released each year since 1969 by the two major Danish porcelain companies. In Denmark, Mother's Day is held on the second Sunday in May. Bakeries and florists are especially busy during this time making special Mors Day cakes and floral arrangements.

#### Norway

Unlike the majority of Nordic countries,

Mother's Day in Norway is always celebrated on the second Sunday in February. The first *Morsdag* celebration in Norway took place in Bergen on Feb. 19, 1919, and was originally a religious celebration. Gifts of chocolates, baked goods and flowers are typically gifted to moms on this special day. **Iceland** 

Mother's day or *Mæðradagurinn* in Iceland was first celebrated in 1934 and is always celebrated on the second Sunday in May.. Though it is not recognized as an official holiday, Mother's Day is widely celebrated across the country. Treats and flowers are exchanged, and the whole family takes the day to do something fun together!


